Serial Flirtations: Rotari's Muses Through July 31, 2017

Serial Flirtations: Rotari's Muses examines Pietro Rotari (1707–1762), an illustrious Italian artist who found success and fortune in Vienna and beyond, ultimately becoming court painter to Empress Elizabeth of Russia. The exhibition brings together eight paintings from the Simon holdings attributed to Rotari and his studio, including his iconic Young Girl Writing a Love Letter. Six rarely displayed character studies, all of which were returned to the artist's family after his death in St. Petersburg and retained until the 1970s by the Cartolari family, his heirs, will be featured as a set.

Maven of Modernism: Galka Scheyer in California April 7—September 25, 2017

Maven of Modernism: Galka Scheyer in California delves into the life of the enterprising dealer responsible for the art phenomenon the "Blue Four"—Lyonel Feininger, Alexei Jawlensky, Paul Klee and Wassily Kandinsky. The exhibition presents exceptional examples from Scheyer's personal collection by the Blue Four artists, as well as works by artists including Alexander Archipenko, László Moholy-Nagy, Pablo Picasso and Diego Rivera, which was given to the Pasadena Art Institute in the early 1950s. All together, these works and related ephemera tell the

fascinating story of this trailblazing impresario, who helped shape California's reputation as a burgeoning center for modern art.

EVENTS & PROGRAMS

LECTURES

Galka Scheyer: Enterprising Prophetess of the Blue Four Gloria Williams Sander, Curator, Norton Simon Museum Saturday, April 22, 4:00–5:00 p.m.



Alexei Jawlensky nicknamed Emmy Scheyer "Galka," the Russian name for a small crow, known to be exceptionally intelligent, energetic and gregarious. These characteristics served Scheyer in her mission to introduce the American public to the avant-garde art of European modernists, especially the Blue Four. Scheyer's activity to educate, cultivate and place their work in private and public collections was nothing short of heroic. This lecture examines the important historical record that the Museum's Blue Four Galka Scheyer Collection presents and one woman's crusade to get it there.

Dear Little Tornado: Galka Scheyer in Hollywood Victoria Dailey, Writer and Independent Curator Saturday, May 13, 4:00–5:00 p.m.



Although Los Angeles had a small group of modern artists in the 1920s, modernism was little known and often disparaged by most of the city's art world. When Galka Scheyer organized the first Blue Four exhibition in Los Angeles in 1926, one artist remarked: "It reminded me of crawling things—of worms or things mouldering in the ground, Ugh! It was awful." Such an uninviting climate did not deter Scheyer, affectionately called "Little Tornado" by Lyonel Feininger, one of the Blue Four. The Little Tornado persisted in her efforts, with varying degrees of success. Her interactions with the pioneering modernists of Los Angeles are discussed in this lecture.

Film Series: Galka's Circle: Josef von Sternberg in Hollywood

In conjunction with the exhibition *Maven of Modernism: Galka Scheyer in California*, the Museum presents a selection of films by director and art collector Josef von Sternberg. Von Sternberg, who jointly sponsored four Blue Four exhibitions in Los Angeles with Galka Scheyer in the 1930s, was just one of many celebrities and collectors in her circle. All of the films featured in this series were produced in the 1930s and star Marlene Dietrich, another of Scheyer's friends.

Morocco (1930), NR

Friday, May 5, 6:00-7:30 p.m.

At a smoky cabaret in Morocco, Légionnaire Tom Brown (Gary Cooper) meets café entertainer Amy Jolly (Marlene Dietrich). A woman with a checkered past, Jolly toys with the callow Brown, but eventually falls hopelessly in love with him.





The Blue Angel (1930), NR Friday, May 12, 6:00–7:45 p.m.

Elderly professor Immanuel Rath's (Emil Jannings) ordered life spins dangerously out of control when he falls for Lola Lola (Marlene Dietrich), a singer and dancer at the Blue Angel nightclub.

Dishonored (1931), NR

Friday, May 19, 6:00-7:30 p.m.

Marie Kolverer (Marlene Dietrich), a Viennese prostitute, offers her services as a spy during World War I. As "Agent X27," she proves invaluable to her superiors, seducing and betraying enemy officers with the greatest of ease. But when she falls in love with Russian spy Col. Kranau (Victor McLaglen), she must face the consequences of her actions.





Shanghai Express (1932), NR Friday, May 26, 6:00–7:20 p.m.

While traveling on a train from Peking to Shanghai, a notorious prostitute named Shanghai Lily (Marlene Dietrich) runs into a former flame (Clive Brook) who is being held hostage and whom she could intervene to save.

The Films of Maya Deren:

Experimental Films 1943—1959 (1959)

Friday, June 9, 6:00-7:20 p.m.

Maya Deren was a leading exponent of experimental cinema and is considered one of its most influential artists. Her films are masterpieces of their era and provide an important insight into the history of the avant-garde. Join us for a special program of back-to-back screenings of her short films: *Meshes of the Afternoon* (1943, 14 minutes), *At Land* (1944, 14 minutes, Silent), *A Study in Choreography for Camera* (1945, 3 minutes, Silent), *Ritual in Transfigured Time* (1946, 15 minutes, Silent), *Meditation on Violence* (1948, 13 minutes) and *The Very Eye of the Night* (1959, 15 minutes).

Moving the Divine

Inspired by works in the Museum's South Asian collection, Moving the Divine explores the variety of ways in which India's Odissi dance engages with ideas and embodiments of the divine. A neoclassical form with deep devotional roots, this virtuosic performance by award-winning dancer Rahul Acharya explores a tradition in which sculpture can comes to life, epics reside in a single body, and the Supreme is a lover who can be petitioned with tears.

ADULT DRAWING CLASS

DRAWING CLASSES

Ways of Seeing and Drawing

Artist and educator May Jong conducts a six-session course focusing on ways of seeing and drawing a variety of artworks in the Museum's collections. Students learn various drawing techniques by studying storytelling, the human figure and landscapes.

Storytelling and the "Ramayana"

Friday, April 21, 6:00-8:00 p.m.

Studying line, pattern and color in a series of paintings depicting the ancient *Ramayana* epic, students create graphite and color pencil drawings illustrating a poem or story. Please bring a poem or story to class. Resources will also be available for students.



Stories about Yourself Friday, April 28, 6:00–8:00 p.m.

Looking at portraits by French artists of the 18th and 19th century, students explore graphite and color pencil techniques to draw self-portraits. Please bring a photograph of yourself (or someone else) at work or working on something. Resources will also be available in class.

Drawing the Human Figure: East Friday, May 12, 6:00–8:00 p.m.

Examining sculptures from South and Southeast Asia, students create the illusion of volume through light and shadow using white charcoal pencil on black paper.

Drawing the Human Figure: West Friday, May 19, 6:00–8:00 p.m.

Observing indoor and outdoor figurative sculptures, students study light and form by working outdoors on scratchboard.



Details in Landscape Friday, May 26, 6:00–8:00 p.m.

Drawing inspiration from European still-life paintings, students work outdoors to capture details of the Sculpture Garden using water-soluble graphite and color pencils.

The Big Picture in Landscape

Friday, June 9, 6:00-8:00 p.m.

Exploring the design compositions of large-scale landscapes, students apply these techniques to draw and paint the landscape of the Sculpture Garden using water-soluble graphite and color pencils.

All levels of experience are welcome. Each class is \$25 (\$20 for members) and is limited to 20 participants. Materials are provided. Advance registration is required and can be made at nortonsimon.org/events.

ADULT ART-MAKING WORKSHOP

Living Sculpture

Saturday, June 3, 10:00 a.m.—1:00 p.m.

Join artist Corrie Siegel for a calming, contemplative day of art marking and viewing the Sculpture Garden. After observing the way in which artworks by Henry Moore, Jacques Lipchitz and Barbara Hepworth are situated in the beautiful garden environment designed by Nancy Goslee Power, participants create a sculpture for their home gardens, or gardens for their homes. Experiment with creating a wind-chime sculpture and your own living sculpture using seeds, nylon, modeling clay and dirt. Students are encouraged to bring small trinkets with them, such as old keys, figurines, buttons, shells or jewelry to give their sculptures a personal touch.

Cause and Effect: The Artist's Response

Sunday, April 9, 1:00–2:00 p.m.

The horrors of war exacted a response from artists, whether it was the Neoclassicists' answer to the Rococo after the French Revolution; Goya's biting social commentary after the French occupation of Spain; the Bauhaus artists' idealism after World War I; or the turn to abstraction after World War II. Using the lens of reaction to conflict, discuss the works by Fragonard, Ingres and Goya; Klee, Kandinsky and Albers; and Giacometti and Sam Francis.



Lives of the Artists: Women in the Arts Sunday, May 14, 1:00–2:00 p.m.

Celebrate women who gained recognition in what was essentially a man's world. View works by such artists as Moillon, Vigée Le Brun, Popova, Morisot and Hepworth and consider the contributions of modern art dealer Galka Scheyer.

Upcycled Art

Earth Day is a day to honor our planet and the environment. View paintings that showcase the Earth's majesty, from the sand dunes of Edward Weston, to the beaches of Gustave Courbet to a rural landscape by Théodore Rousseau. Help keep the Earth beautiful by transforming materials that would otherwise be thrown away into upcycled art.

Bird Day Nests

Celebrate Bird Day by identifying various kinds of birds in the Museum's collections. If you look closely at Roelandt Savery's Landscape with Ruins and Animals, how many birds can you find? How about in Frans Snyders's Still Life with Fruit and Vegetables? There is also Garuda, a part-bird, part-human Hindu deity. Can you find him in the Asian art galleries? Admire these birds and make a mixed-media nest for a feathered friend.

Explore how Claude Monet captured the feeling of summer in *The Artist's Garden at Vétheuil.* Afterward, go into the Sculpture Garden and watch as the sky begins to change color and the garden settles into evening. Capture your impressions of the Sculpture Garden using oil pastels on canvas.



Let's Experiment!

Thursday, June 22, 1:00-3:00 p.m.

Discover the variety of materials and textures that artists have experimented with to express their visions, as shown in the exhibition Maven of Modernism: Galka Scheyer in California. Take inspiration from artists Alexei Jawlensky, Paul Klee and Kurt Schwitters and create an artwork choosing from a variety of materials, including metallic paper, textured cardboard, cloth, oil pastels and more.

Come Sail Away

Thursday, June 29, 1:00-3:00 p.m.

Magnificent boats, big and small, are illustrated in paintings by 18th- to 20th-century artists such as Claude-Joseph Vernet, Claude Monet and Lyonel Feininger. Design a sponge boat with paper sails, and watch it float in the bathtub, the pool or even the sea.

MIDDLE SCHOOL ARTSLAB

Kandinsky, Watercolor and Stencils

Wednesday, April 12, 3:45-4:45 p.m.

From Cool Depths highlights Vasily Kandinsky's use of a splatter technique to create a composition of geometric shapes floating in a warm atmosphere. Try a similar method using small spray bottles of liquid watercolor and paper stencils.



Rococo Hues Wednesday, May 17, 3:45—4:45 p.m.

Jean-Honoré Fragonard experimented with complementary colors to create depth; he worked during the 18th century, a time when the study of color harmonies flourished. Look at Fragonard's Happy Lovers and create a composition of color that blends and divides using chalk pastel.

This one-hour program for middle school students (ages 11–14) is free, and space is limited to 15 participants. All materials are provided, and advance registration is required at nortonsimon.org/events.

YOUNG ARTISTS' WORKSHOP

Letting Go with Color, Line and Gesture Saturday, May 20, 12:30–2:30 p.m.

Explore artworks from the exhibition Maven of Modernism: Galka Scheyer in California with artist Samara Caughey. Students focus on color, line and gestural marks and discuss the power of expression in the paintings—what this might mean to either a maker or a viewer. Taking a cue from the Blue Four artists—Lyonel Feininger, Paul Klee, Alexei Jawlensky and Vasily Kandinsky—students create gestural and abstract watercolor paintings that are spontaneous and intuitive.

TEEN ARTS ACADEMY



Studio Practice: First Impression
Saturday, April 29, 1:30—4:00 p.m. AND
Sunday, April 30, 1:30—4:00 p.m.

Artist Albert Valdez leads a two-day painting workshop exploring the work of 19th-century Impressionists and Post-Impressionists in the Museum's collections. Students look closely at selected works and investigate artists' application of paint, use of hues, value, scale and composition. Through discussion and observation, students provide evidence of artists' attempts at capturing movement, light, atmosphere and form. Students then apply their observations to create their own works of art.

The two-day course is free, and space is limited to 18 participants. All materials are provided. Advance registration is required and can be made at nortonsimon.org/education/teens.
