ON VIEW



In Search of New Markets: Craft Traditions in Nineteenth-Century India

April 6—September 3, 2018

In Search of New Markets explores how Indian craft traditions were re-imagined for the export market in the 19th century. The objects on view in this intimate exhibition were created for commercial purposes and marks the first time that several of these works have been on view at the Museum. *In Search of New Markets* explores the historical sources and practices that informed the production of ceramics and wooden furniture in colonial India.

It also reveals the distinctly modern modes of promotion and distribution that were used to generate demand for them.



Line & Color: The Nature of Ellsworth Kelly

June 1—October 29, 2018

Line & Color: The Nature of Ellsworth Kelly illustrates how Kelly, one of the progenitors of modernism, drew inspiration from nature and translated that into his own form of abstraction. This exhibition brings together two of Kelly's lithographic suites, *Suite of Twenty-Seven Color Lithographs* and *Suite of Plant Lithographs*, as well as two large-scale paintings, *White over Blue* and *Red Orange White Green Blue*.

Taking Shape: Degas as Sculptor

November 10, 2017—April 9, 2018

Taking Shape: Degas as Sculptor explores the improvisational nature of Degas's artistic practice through the Norton Simon's collection of *modèles*, the first and only set of bronzes cast from the original wax and plaster statuettes.

Robber Baron Collectors of the Gilded Age: Morgan, Frick, De Young Colin B. Bailey, Director, Morgan Library & Museum Saturday, May 5, 4:00–5:00 p.m.

Award-winning dancer and choreographer Vijayalakshmi performs Mohiniyattam, a classical Indian dance from Kerala, in the southern region of India. It is deeply rooted in the sacred feminine and celebrates energy, power and strength by using graceful movements

In his comic novel *The Outcry*, published in 1911, Henry James characterizes the American robber baron collectors as the "conquering horde... only armed now with huge chequebooks instead of spears and battle-axes." The creation of outstanding private collections of European art in America was a phenomenon of the Gilded Age. James based the character of the American banker, Breckenridge Bender—"the wretch

who bagged Lady Lappington's Longhi"—on John Pierpont Morgan (1837—1913), one of the three collectors discussed in this lecture. Morgan is joined by two younger "squillionaires"—as Bernard and Mary Berenson called them—born the same year: Henry Clay Frick (1849—1919), the Pittsburgh industrialist, and Michael Henry De Young (1849—1925), founder of San Francisco's *Daily Dramatic Chronicle*. All three have left institutions that bear their names; yet, as Colin Bailey examines, they can be seen as quite distinct in their taste, education and motivation as collectors and founders of museums.

FILM SERIES

The British Raj between Page and Screen

Join us for a series of films based on works of literature that portray life in India during the period of colonial rule known as the British Raj (1858–1947). Based on novels and short stories in English, Hindi-Urdu and Bengali that were published before 1947, these films examine the legacy of the Raj from the vantage point of an independent India during the decades that followed.



Kim (1950), NR

Directed by Victor Saville Friday, May 4, 5:30–7:25 p.m.

During the British Raj, the orphan (Dean Stockwell) of a British soldier poses as a Hindu and is torn between his loyalty to a Buddhist mystic (Errol Flynn) and aiding the English secret service. The film is based on the novel *Kim* by Rudyard Kipling, first published in book form in 1901.



Shatranj Ke Khilari (The Chess Players) (1977), NR Directed by Satyajit Ray Friday, May 11, 5:30—7:40 p.m.

In this movie set in 1856, shortly before the first Indian struggle for independence, Wajid Ali Shah is an indifferent ruler who composes poems and listens to music, while British general James Outram (Sir Richard Attenborough) arrives on a secret mission to clear the way for the British. Meanwhile, two

noblemen obsessively play endless games of chess, ignoring the situation that unfolds around them. The film is based on the short story *Shatranj Ke Khilari* by Munshi Premchand, published in Hindi and Urdu in 1924. In Hindi/Urdu and English with English subtitles.



The River (1951), NR

Directed by Jean Renoir

Friday, May 18, 5:30–7:10 p.m.

Director Jean Renoir's entrancing first color feature—shot entirely on location in India—is a visual tour de force. The film eloquently contrasts the growing pains of three young women with the immutability of the Ganges River, around which their daily lives unfold. *The River* gracefully explores the fragile connections between transitory emotions and everlasting creation. The film is based on the novel *The River* by Rumer Godden, published in 1946.

Ghare Baire (The Home and the World) (1984), NR Directed by Satyajit Ray Friday, May 25, 5:30–7:30 p.m.

In 1907, Nikhil (Victor Banerjee)—a wealthy yet enlightened and charitable Bengali landowner—encourages his wife Bimala (Swatilekha Sengupta) to emerge from the traditional female seclusion of purdah and introduces her to his old friend Sandip (Soumitra Chatterjee), a radical leader in the Swadeshi movement. Bimala is deeply affected by Sandip's revolutionary fervor and experiences a profound political awakening that draws her out of her home and into the tumultuous world

of Indian nationalism. The film is based on the novel *Ghare Baire* by Rabindranath Tagore, published in Bengali in 1916. In Bengali with English subtitles.

Garden Party Saturday, June 30, 5:00—7:30 p.m.



EDUCATION PROGRAMS: ADULT

ADULT DRAWING CLASSES

Drawing at the Norton Simon

Join artist and author Richard E. Scott in exploring the Norton Simon's collections and Sculpture Garden. Working in pencil, students learn how to look with an artist's eye, gain confidence in a variety of mark-making techniques and enrich their museum-going experience.



Abstract Shape

Friday, April 6, 6:00–8:00 p.m.

In the first session, students learn how to see and interpret shapes in an artwork in order to draw accurately. They employ these observational techniques to draw works in the 20th-century collection.

Shape Becomes Form

Friday, April 13, 6:00–8:00 p.m.

In the second session, students learn how to transform two-dimensional shapes into threedimensional forms, adding a sculptural dimension to their drawings. They apply this exercise to draw works in the South Asian art collection.

Capturing Light Friday, April 27, 6:00–8:00 p.m.

In the third session, students learn how to capture the effects of light to add nuance and radiance to their drawings. They apply this approach to draw works in the Southeast Asian art collection.



Linear Perspective

Friday, May 11, 6:00–8:00 p.m.

In the fourth session, students learn how Renaissance masters achieved the illusion of depth in their paintings. They incorporate these insights to effectively draw perspective in works from the 14th to 18th centuries.

Composition

Friday, May 18, 6:00–8:00 p.m.

In the fifth session, students learn how to analyze and understand the designs of masterworks through compositional sketches. They use these techniques to draw works in the 19th-century collection.



Plein Air Drawing Friday, May 25, 6:00–8:00 p.m.

In the final session, students learn how to draw outdoor subjects and overcome challenges such as continually changing light. They apply this lesson to draw from the Sculpture Garden.

All levels of experience are welcome. Each class is \$25 (\$20 for members) and is limited to 20 participants. Materials are provided. Advance registration is required at nortonsimon.org/events.

ADULT ART-MAKING WORKSHOP



Rodin: The Dynamic Gesture Saturday, May 26, 11:00 a.m.—2:00 p.m.

Auguste Rodin is considered one of the greatest sculptors of all time. The energy of his figures' poses is matched by the dynamism in the modeling of his sculptures. Artist Christopher Slatoff leads a sculpting workshop investigating Rodin's use of light, shadow, proportion and dramatic modeling to express his ideas. Using oilbased clay, participants create sculptures of their hands.

The fee of \$35 (\$28 for members) includes all materials and admission to the galleries on the day of class. Advance registration is required at nortonsimon.org/events.

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

YOUNG ARTISTS' WORKSHOP



Small Lines, Big Colors: The Brushstrokes of Vincent van Gogh Saturday, April 28, 12:30–2:30 p.m.

Join artist Michelle Antonisse for a workshop exploring color, line and composition. Study the way in which Van Gogh used short, saturated lines of color to create his compositions *Portrait of a Peasant, Head of a Peasant Woman in a White Bonnet* and *The Mulberry Tree*. Discover how these elements reflect representation, mood and the artist's process. After examining Van Gogh's use of color and line, create a composition using colorful embroidery floss.

Van Gogh's Impasto

Wednesday, May 23, 3:45–4:45 p.m.

Examine the thick texture in Van Gogh's *Mulberry Tree* and learn how he used more than a paintbrush to create his composition. Using painting medium and tools, experiment with texture on small canvas panels.

TEEN ARTS ACADEMY



Flora Spectra—A Multimedia Still-Life Workshop Saturday, May 5, 1:30–3:30 p.m.

Artist Gustavo Alberto Garcia Vaca leads students in a multimedia workshop exploring the still-life paintings of Henri Fantin-Latour, Odilon Redon, Vincent van Gogh and Juan Gris. The art-making project follows the prompt: how does a still life invoke meaning? Students learn techniques in sketching, painting and photography (using smartphones or cameras), and each student creates three artworks: a pencil sketch, a multimedia painting and a photograph.

This course for students ages 13–18 is free, and space is limited to 18 participants. Students are encouraged to bring a smartphone or camera; there

will also be a camera available for use during the workshop. Additional materials are provided. Advance registration is required at nortonsimon.org/events.
